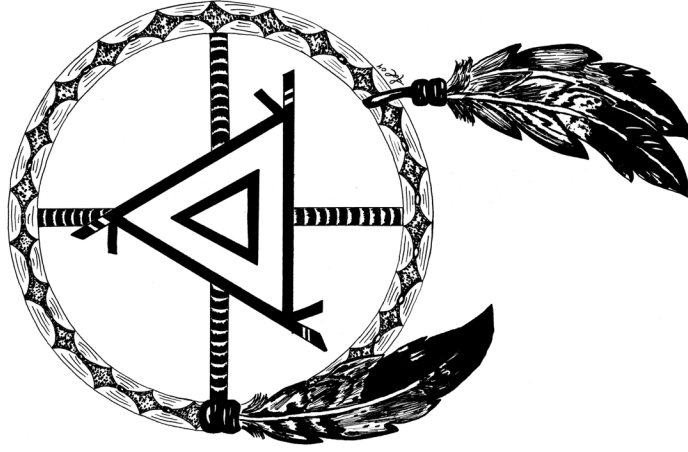

TNAS Mission

Triangle Native American Society (TNAS) is an all volunteer organization, a visionary entity empowering American Indian people residing in the Triangle Community to become resilient leaders advocating for educational advancement, economic sufficiency, self-determination and cultural inclusiveness and awareness by capitalizing and building upon the strengths of the community and the infrastructure that promotes and encourages the blending of diverse groups.

There are more than 2,100 American Indians in Wake County alone, and our numbers are increasing across the Triangle area (Raleigh, Durham, Chapel Hill and surrounding communities). It is estimated that there are more than 20 tribal entities represented in the Triangle Area. The Triangle Native American Society (TNAS) is a non-profit organization founded in 1984 to provide assistance and support for Native Americans in the Triangle and surrounding area.

Our History

TNAS is a 501(c) 3 organization founded in 1983 to provide financial, social and cultural support to Native Americans in the Triangle area. Currently, there are over 2,100 American Indians in Wake County alone and numbers are increasing across the Triangle area (Raleigh, Durham, Chapel Hill and surrounding communities). It is estimated that there are more than 20 tribal entities represented in the Triangle area. TNAS was recognized as a state American Indian urban organization in 2000. Our history is best described by what we do as an organization through our service on boards and commissions, facilitation of tribal activities, sponsoring events for the community, collaboration with organizations, and our assistance in establishing organizations.

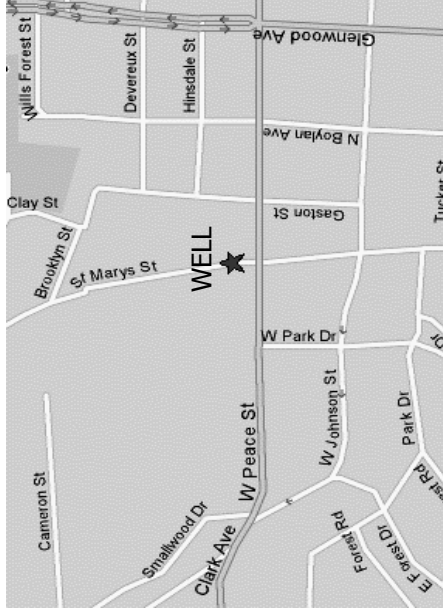
